Area voters choose local representation

School and City Election results are in

choosing the perfect read.

rea voters have chosen representation to their cities and school board by their participation in elections held Nov. 2.

Ackley voters chose Mike Nuss to continue to serve them as mayor. Nuss was first appointed to the position in May and will now serve a two-year term in the role with 213 votes cast in his favor. Patrick Hurt, who is moving from the area, received 22 votes.

Elected to serve four-year terms on the council were Daniel Scallon, who ran unopposed for Hurt's vacated seat on the council, received 202 votes. Incumbents Judy Crawford and Jesus Flores garnered 105 and 217 votes, respectively.

Results for the AGWSR School Board – District 1, include Gabrielle Fistler with 376 votes and Lanae Metzgar with 417 votes. Fistler will fill a seat on the board currently filled by Hurt. Hurt chose not to seek re-election. Josh Meyer will continue to serve the district with 464 votes cast in his favor. Meyer currently serves as board president.

Both public measures for AGWSR were successfully passed. The Revenue Purpose Statement passed with 87.42 percent of ballots cast in approval.

The manner in which the district may spend SAVE funds, which would have expired in 2031, was extended through 2050. Nearly 76 percent of the 465 ballots cast were cast in favor of the extension, with just over 24 percent of voters cast-ing their ballot against.

SAVE funds are used for a wide variety of district needs ranging from infrastructure for technology, school safety and security, building, remodeling, reconstruction, repair, establishing and maintaining playgrounds and recreational areas, and to pay off principal and interest of general obligation bonds issued for infrastructure and for tax revenue bonds, and more.

Timothy Stearns was re-elected as mayor of Steamboat Rock with 65 votes cast in his favor. Elected to serve on the council in Steamboat Rock were Kevin Pieters and Cory Schurman with 63 and 55 votes, respectively.

Todd Olmstead will serve as the mayor for Geneva with 26 votes (68.42 percent of ballots cast for the position). Residents of the community will be represented by Mark Diemer, Kristi Schachterle, Larry Kreimeyer, Jesse Viet, and Jimmy Zacharias.

In Wellsburg, residents chose Eric Minteer for mayor with 82 votes cast in his favor. Voters cast ballots for Teresa Eiten (79 votes), Matthew Duncan (77 votes), and Dale Eilderts (83 votes) to serve as their representatives on the Wellsburg City Council. ●

Open seats available on county boards and commissions

he Hardin County Board of Supervisors has set a Nov. 30 deadline for residents to apply to serve on a number of vacancies on county boards and commissions.

The supervisors asked that interested parties submit their applications to the Auditor's office by the close of business at 4:30 that day. An online application form can be found at the counties website under the Boards and Commissions tab.

The board will appoint or reappoint board and commission members at its organizational meeting on Jan. 3, 2022.

Open posts include:

County Conservation Board: (One seat - fiveyear term & one, oneyear ex-officio term) This board is responsible for establishing policies, conservation programming, and maintaining conservation lands ances, and special perin Hardin County. They generally meet the second Monday of each month.

County Board of Health: (Two seats three-year terms) The Board of Health is responsible for setting public health policy and enforcing public health laws. They meet every other month with additional meetings as needed.

Mental Health/Developmental Disabilities (MH/DD) Advisory Board: (Three seats – three-year terms & one vacancy ending 12/31/2022) This Advisory Board assists in development and review of the County Mental Health Plan, and in carrving out the Plan's goals and objectives. They meet at least quarterly throughout the year.

Zoning Adjustment Board: (One seat - fiveyear term) The Board considers appeals, requests for zoning varimits. They meet as needed. Must be rural resident to serve.

Board of Condem**nation:** (Twenty-eight seats - one-year terms) This Board is composed of seven business people, seven real estate people, seven farmers, and seven property owners. They meet when necessary to set land values in condemnation proceedings.

Pioneer Cemetery Commission: (One seat three-year term) This Commission shall identify all sites in Hardin County that meet the definition of a Pioneer Cemetery, and be responsible for their preservation, repair, and maintenance. They meet monthly during the summer months.

Hoffman, a Republican who has served on the board of supervisors since 2016, said his interest was piqued more than a year ago when redistricting talks began. The seat will be open for the 2022 election because Rep. Dave Deyoe and Speaker of the House Pat Grassley shared portions of the newly formed district consisting of Grundy, Hardin and a sliver of eastern Black Hawk counties.

The Iowa Legislature overwhelmingly approved

alysts before making his decision.

"A lot of things had to align here," Hoffman said. "A lot of strategy for the last year looking at what may or may not come of the redistricting. Also, making sure my family was ready for a potential change. Things all just came together."

Hoffman said he made his final decision to run on or about Oct. 26. He added that he would probably not have run for office if he was still in Deyoe's district or if the map had shifted him into Grassley's district. Top priorities for Hoffman if he is elected next year would be tax reform, parental control Republicans from the Statehouse contacted him this week encouraging him to run.

"After the second set of maps were released, that's when I started getting calls from the Iowa House Republican caucus saying, 'Hey, we would really like you to strongly consider this," he said.

State Sen. Annette Sweeney also announced on Oct. 28 that she will run for re-election. Sweeney's district will shift eastward to cover Hardin, Tama, Grundy and Poweshiek counties.

The new House, Senate and Congressional maps will go into effect for the November 2022 election.




Wellsburg: On Thursday, Nov. 11, the AGWSR Wellsburg Center School will be honoring veterans at a Veterans Day

Ackley man accused of soliciting prostitution, again

n Ackley man with two pri- change for coming to his Iowa or prostitution convictions was arrested on Nov. 2 for allegedly soliciting

prostitution from and stalking two women.

According to court records, 71-year-old Leslie Duane Janssen has been charged with two counts of prosti-

tution and two counts of stalking, all aggravated misdemeanors. He was arrested at his home in Ackley on a valid warrant and taken to the Hardin County Jail.

The affidavits allege Janssen offered money to a woman in exFalls shop to perform sexual acts sometime between May 24 and June 11. He also allegedly offered a different woman money for sex

sometime between Sept. 9 and 24. The stalking charges stem from Janssen allegedly engaging in conduct causing the two women to feel "frightened, intimidated

and threatened" at a local convenience store where the two work. The women complained he

would hug, or come close to hugging them, making them feel nervous and intimidated. One of the women also said Janssen would drive often past her home slowly. He also allegedly entered one of the women's unoccupied vehicles and left \$100, but claimed the money was not about sex.

Janssen has also been charged with two counts of third-degree harassment and a count of assault - all simple misdemeanors. He posted a \$2,300 bond either Nov. 2 in the evening or Nov. 3 in the morning.

Janssen was convicted of soliciting prostitution in 2019 and 2021.

He faces up to eight years in jail if convicted on all counts. No court hearings have been scheduled as of Nov. 3.

from Wellsburg driveway to Knapp Center sidelines

A llison (Starr) Pohlman credits the routine driveway beatings in Wellsburg at the hands of her brothers for helping her get to where she is today – the new head coach of the Drake women's basketball team.

Those rough scrimmages turned into an All-State career at Wellsburg-Steamboat Rock where she helped usher in the five-player era, which led to a Hall of Fame career at the University of Northern Iowa where she remains in the record books. It's in her DNA, which she spilled a lot of while playing her brothers Scott and Chad.

"High school was a lot of fun," Pohlman said. "I got to be on the All-Tournament Team after we got to State and was fortunate enough to win a game. I look back now and feel like that was such an accomplishment."

From W–SR, where she was a conference player of the year, she turned to UNI. She led the Panthers in points, rebounds, assists, three–pointers, steals, field goals, free throws and minutes played – setting new school records for points, total rebounds, defensive rebounds, free throws made, free throws attempted and scoring average in a season as a senior.

Pohlman capped her career by ranking second in UNI history with 1,463 points, third with 711 rebounds, second with 274 steals, fifth with 278 assists, and the school record holder for free throws made, free throws attempted, offensive rebounds, defensive rebounds, double-doubles and steals per game. She was a member of the conference

All-Freshman Team and was a three-time selection to All-Conference. Pohlman was inducted into the UNI Athletics Hall of Fame in the fall of 2011.

After serving some time as a graduate assistant and assistant coach at UNI, she was hired at Drake as an assistant in 2007. The 1996 W-SR and 2000 UNI grad was then moved to associate head coach at Drake in 2014.

As the Bulldogs' recruiting coordinator under Jennie Baranczyk, Pohlman assembled rosters that advanced to three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances, won four regular-season Missouri Valley Conference titles, two MVC Tournament championships and a record of 123-39.

When Baranczyk accepted the head job at the University of Oklahoma in early April, the Bulldogs didn't have far to look for their new head coach.

Pohlman's recruiting efforts led to the Bulldogs earning six Jackie Stiles MVC Player of the Year honors and four MVC Freshman of the Year accolades. A total of 27 of her recruits have earned All-MVC honors during her tenure. Academically, the team has ranked in the top-10 nationally in team GPA for six-straight seasons, with the Bulldogs earning a total of six CoSIDA Academic All-Americans to rank among the national leaders.

Not a bad basketball resume for somebody who set out to be a dietician. Pohlman holds a Bachelor of Science in dietetics and a master's degree in health education from UNI.

Now firmly entrenched as Drake prepares to start the season, Pohlman said she has had a chance to finally breath after the whirlwind that surrounded her hiring.

"It was such an amazing emotional roller-coaster of a process, but it's also been so rewarding," Pohlman said. "It was amazing the outpouring of people who reached out to me. It definitely makes a gal feel pretty special."

The excitement over being named the head coach didn't last long. Pohlman said it was replaced with finding a staff and getting ready for the upcoming season.

f there is one thing Mike Finger knows, it's basketball. Before spending the last three

Finger said he wants to create a program that reflects that, noting that he and Gann shared the same philosophies.

"I want a program that is fun and rewarding and establishes a strong sense of camaraderie for everyone who participates," Finger said. "One that consistently demonness, respect, determination, and loyalty."

Finger said he is excited to be the head coach, but noted there is another dynamic other than being the "new guy." Daughter Grace is a senior on the team.

"It's really fun being able to spend all the extra time with her," Finger said. "It can be challenging for Grace though, but I think she does a good job dealing with an overbearing dad/coach."

Finger admits that a head coach-daughter combination can make things weird on the team and at home. But he added he hasn't seen any of those cliches or stereotypes. "If it has created an awkward or uncomfortable dynamic with the rest of the team, I haven't noticed it," Finger said. "And it hasn't made things weird at home, either. Grace and I have worked out and practiced basketball together since she was in grade school, probably around eight years. I've also coached several of her club teams as she was growing up."

Finger's first season at the helm began Monday with the first official practice. AGWSR's first game is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 23, at Hudson.




