

Three buildings located on the corner of Dodge and Nebraska Streets. The main building was built in 1867 and served as the first schoolhouse. By 1885 it had become the GAR Hall for the Grand Army of the Republic. In 1919 it became the home for the American Legion. It also served as the public library prior to 1904 when the Carnegie Library was built. The Historical Society acquired the build in 1967 and turned it into a museum. Two doors down is the last prairie front building to survive in Algona. The bottom floor holds artifacts and the top floor serves as the library for the Historical Society. The POWs were missing home and the church festivities of Christmas, so they made 65 half-life-sized figures to connect them to their families and customs in Germany.

The people of Algona were impressed with the figures and viewing the scene became a tradition. The one-of-a-kind nativity is set up as a permanent exhibit each Christmas.

Members of a committee through the Algona First United Methodist Church oversees the operations of the scene and have been the caretakers since 1958.

The scene is located at the Kossuth County Fairgrounds and is open for viewing every day in December and by special appointment the rest of the year.

The Nativity Scene was the inspiration for the movie "Silent Night in Algona".

Tietz Park is located on the Algona Recreational Trail and near the Algona Family YMCA. It offers a variety of playground equipment and a new shelter house with restrooms.





ALGONA RECREATION TRAIL

Starts at Williams Park

This paved trail takes walkers, runners, bikers and others through Algona neighborhoods and fields. Phase 1 of the trail is 1.3 miles, and starts at Williams Park/YMCA, then heads east along State Street to Tietz Park. From there trail users may utilize the sidewalks along E. State Street and Richardson Court to get to where the trail restarts. Individuals then will head north until they reach the bull ditch area, where the trail connects with Phase 2. The trail turns west along the ditch, crossing Finn Drive and then ending at Clarke Street. The trail is signed and marked.

Phase 2 is a .8 mile stretch that includes a beautiful bridge that spans the bull ditch and continues north on Finn Drive and then west on Poplar Street. It turns north and runs along the east edge of the Bishop Garrigan High School athletic fields.

A trail head and concrete parking lot are located at Tietz Park. A rock parking area is also available near the AMU substation on Finn Drive.

The Algona Aquatic Center is an outdoor facility that is open from late May through August. It is more than just a pool. With slides, diving boards, lounge chairs and so much more, the aquatic center is a great spot for all ages.

Adults and children 42 inches or taller can race down the yellow and blue flume slides, and those who pass the swim test can demonstrate their flips and tricks on the diving boards.

The shallow area has a variety of water features for the little ones, including the small alligator slide and water umbrellas.

Those who want to catch some rays can take advantage of the colorful chaise lounge chairs, and those who choose the shade can relax under one of the large umbrellas or other shade structures around the facility.

When it's time to cool off and refuel, the concession stand has a selection of treats such as ice cream sandwiches and corn dogs that can be enjoyed in the shaded eating area. Carry-in food or beverages are not allowed.

Lockers are available, and patrons are encouraged to take their own padlocks to secure their items. Locks can be rented at the admission counter.





The first land acquisition for the Kossuth County Conservation Board (KCCB) came in 1965 when the land was purchased for the development of Smith Lake Park. The lake was constructed in the fall of 1965 and began filling in 1966. Over the last 50 plus years, numerous amenities and features have been added to the original park to make it a premier outdoor recreational destination in the county. Smith Lake is located three miles north of Algona on U.S. Highway 169.

Currently, the KCCB manages over 2,200 acres in the county encompassing 28 different areas. Activities at the various parks and wildlife areas include camping, picnicking, hiking, fishing, hunting, bird watching, kayaking, canoeing and many more. Many of the park areas have open and enclosed shelters available for the public to enjoy. The Water's Edge Nature Center is located on the northwest corner of Smith Lake and is the hub for the Environmental Education program. The nature center, which was completed in 2007, features a large meeting room, wildlife displays, library, storm shelter room and staff offices. A variety of nature programs for all ages are held in this facility throughout the year. Two of the most popular events include the Halloween Hike which will be held Saturday, October 21 and the Christmas bird feeder building program which will be held the last week of December.

CAMPSITES

The KCCB manages campgrounds at three different parks including Smith Lake, Siems Park and Burt Lake Park. The three park areas all offer their own unique camping experience. The campgrounds are open April 15 to October 31 depending on weather conditions. Reservations are taken for Siems Park and Smith Lake south campgrounds on half of the available sites. The remaining sites are walk-in only and are available on a first come-first served basis.

The 15 sites located at the north campground at Smith Lake are all full hookup sites including electrical, water and sewer. They can be rented on a seasonal, daily or monthly basis. Other amenities nearby include a modern restroom with a shower, open shelter, boat ramp, fishing jetty, swimming beach, playground equipment and a hiking trail.

The south campground at Smith Lake has 49 sites with electric/water at each site. A tent camping area is also available and is located near the shelter. Other amenities in this campground include modern restroom and showers, an enclosed shelter, playground equipment, volleyball and basketball courts, swimming beach, walking trail, horseshoe pits, and a dump station

Siems Park (located two miles southeast of Whittemore) has 30 electrical sites located in two separate areas of the park. Several tent camping areas are also present. The camping areas are located adjacent to five connected gravel pits which offer water based recreation including swimming, boating and fishing. Other amenities at this park include two shelters, water hydrants, playground equipment, modern restrooms with showers, a disc golf course and a dump station.

The smallest campground the KCCB manages is Burt Lake Park. It is located four miles west and 8.5 miles north of Swea City on the Minnesota border. Twelve electrical sites are available as well as tent camping areas. Other features at this park include a water hydrant, primitive restrooms, open shelter,

hiking trail and lake recreation including swimming, fishing and boating.

Algona offers loans and programs for housing costs

A COMMUNITY TO CALL HOME

If you are new to the Algona community, or looking to purchase a home, help is available. The City of Algona offers a range of programs to encourage people to make their home here, improve a home or build a new house.

HELP FOR HOME IMPROVEMENTS

The Residential Urban Revitalization program is designed to encourage new residential construction and significant improvements to existing homes by providing exemption from property tax on the value added to a property by qualifying improvements. Under the program, an owner may choose property tax exemption on the value added to the property at a rate of either 100% for five years or a sliding scale (80%-20%) over 10 years.

Algona's Housing Rehabilitation Revolving Loan Fund is also available to provide an affordable source of loan monies to very low-and moderate-income households to rehabilitate and make livability improvements to their owner-occupied, single-family dwelling. The maximum loan amount available to any one borrower/home is \$15,000. The minimum loan amount is \$1,000. Maximum term of the loan repayment is 10 years. Interest rates range from 1% to 3% based on income.

Loaned funds may only be used to finance property improvements which substantially protect or improve the basic livability or utility of the property. Use of improvement funds include but are not limited to plumbing, furnace work, siding or external painting, roof repair, insulation, window replacement/repair, electrical work, water drainage, foundation repair and floor coverings due to repair.

DOWNPAYMENT ASSISTANCE

The City of Algona encourages home ownership and, for households earning at or below 120% of the Kossuth County Low-to-Moderate Income rate, offers the Housing Down Payment Assistance Revolving Loan Fund. Applicants meeting program requirements may receive up to \$7,500 or 10% of the purchase price (whichever is less) toward the down payment and eligible closing costs to purchase a home in Algona. The home must be owner-occupied. Interest rates vary from 1% to 3% based on income.


farmers market
