Ida Grove City Hall, Community Hall demolished

The Ida Grove City Hall and Community Hall were demolished last week, as well as the adjacent Ivers-en Radio and TV building. The city hall, which was built in 1906, will be replaced with a smaller building in the same location. The new building will contain offices and council chambers, but no event center. It will most likely be a one-story building. The Ida Grove City Council has been operating in a temporary office located at the Rec Center since February of 2021. The Council had discussed renovating the old City Hall, but bids for the project came in too high over budget, so the Council made the decision to demolish.

Lansink retiring from Army after 22 years of service

Mickey Lansink, who grew up on a farm near Battle Creek, is retiring from the Army after 22 years of service and six overseas deployments. Lansink, who graduated with the BC-IG Class of 2001 and will be 39 years old on St. Patrick's Day, had achieved the rank of Chief Warrant Officer Three in the Army.
