Smell of baked goods to fill Main Street this week

The newest business to join Larchwood's Main Street, My Favorite Baked Goods, is excited to finally announce its opening dates. My Favorite Baked Goods will officially open for business Tuesday, March 28. Store hours will be Tuesday-Saturday from 6 a.m.-2 p.m. and Sunday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. The grand opening celebration is being planned for a few weeks later, April 14-16.

Owners, Shelly Weideman and Kelly Lynch, are excited to begin serving the community of Larchwood with star items such as sweet potato cinnamon rolls, Oreo brownies and loaded scones. There will be rotating weekly specials featuring flavor combinations Weideman has been designing for the menu.

For the first month or so, the two sisters plan to focus solely on getting their bakery off the ground and getting into a rhythm. However, Lynch said they have many exciting plans they hope to implement throughout the coming months.

The first of these plans will be a

first and third Sundays. "Typically on Sunday brunches we'll have an egg souffle type egg bake, bacon, sausage, some kind of potatoes, usually carved ham and roast, fried chicken, French toast or pancakes and probably our sweet potato cinnamon rolls

for dessert," said Lynch. Doughnut lovers out there will be excited for Saturdays in the near future. "Saturday is the custom doughnut day," said Lynch. "If you're like me, you like filled donuts, but I'm very

Sunday brunch twice a month on the particular about the filling. There are certain fillings I don't like. What our idea is on Saturdays we'll have four to five different flavors of fillings," she explained. "Some of them will be fairly normal, like there may be raspberry or there may be amaretto almond or mocha coffee, or a mix of fruit and cream filling and you get to pick. You can get custom-filled donuts."

In the summer, plans include a yogurt bar available for people to make their own morning yogurt cups, as well as to give kids a healthy treat. In

the fall, they plan on serving soups and sandwiches during the day, as well as doing a themed, multi-course dinner one night.

One other idea Lynch jokingly described as a, "blatant rip-off of the old Pizza Hut promotion."

The My Favorite Baked Goods version includes a small area in the bakery with children's books based around baked goods, such as "If You Give a Mouse a Cookie." Lynch explained the idea. "What we're planning to do is to start a kids' club after we get going. If the kids read, they can get something once a month. If they read "Mr. Cupcake Has the Sprinkles," we check them off and they get a mini cupcake."

As they plan for the future, the sisters are still holding to their original vision for the bakery. "Our idea is it's a community place, a community gathering area," said Lynch. "So if card groups want to come in and have card parties. We will also be offering it for events, so if you have a party or a shower or something like that, contact us and we'll be happy to set something up."

Committee looking for community center feedback

A new committee has been formed in Inwood to help city leaders decide how to move forward with the community center after the eastern portion of the building's roof collapsed in January. The community center building committee is being led by Inwood city council members, Becca Bixler and Chad Evans, along with volunteer members from the

community. Bixler says that Mayor Gerald Brands selected Evans and herself to spearhead the committee. To gauge interest and get opinions, Bixler and Evans created an anonymous survey that collected people's opinions on how to move forward with the community center.

After getting the results from the anonymous survey, the two moved forward and

put out the call for people to join the committee if they were interested. Bixler says they looked for people who had a good understanding of the center's previous uses and possible future needs.

"The committee's primary objective is to review the survey results, discuss ideas and courses of action, and then provide a short list of viable recommendations to the city council for its deliberation and endorsement," Bixler explained. "Once the course of action is determined, the committee will be asked to support follow-up efforts if needed which could include grant writing, fundraising,

The committee had its first meeting March 6 and discussed what future plans could hold for the community center. No plans have moved forward yet as the city council collects bids for demolition and removal.
