Shelly Park project now in state of flux

Grant issues could upend redevelopment

A major hiccup due to the absence of certain federally-required grant language in recent bid documents could put the Shelly Park redevelopment project in jeopardy.

For more than a year, city staff has been working toward securing outside funding to repair the ailing retaining walls and add Americans with Disability Act (ADA) compliant sidewalks to meander through one of the city's biggest attractions.

To much rejoicing, Manchester was awarded a \$342,062 Community Development Block Grant through the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) for the project, which was followed by even more welcome news when bids for the contract came in \$47.367 under the architect's estimate of \$328,628.
