"When I think back to the first set, we weren't serving aggressively as we did in sets two and three. I think in the second and third sets, we kept them out of system much more of the time with tough serving. We knew that Hinton is a strong enough team not to give up, but I think they just had more difficulty getting the ball to the hitters they wanted to go to," said Timmermans. "We passed well overall, served tough, ran our offense efficiently, and had good defensive plays and blocks that deterred their offense."

The Knights will play in an event hosted by Western in Hull on Saturday, Oct. 8, before concluding the War Eagle season on Tuesday and Thursday, Oct. 11 and 13, against Remsen St. Mary's and South O'Brien on the road.

School board favors conference requests

ORANGE CITY — The MOC-Floyd Valley Community School District Board of Education unanimously approved on Monday, Oct. 10, the request of George-Little Rock to leave the Siouxland Conference and the request of Unity Christian High School to join the 10-school group.

The requests were part of the agenda of the regular board neeting.

District Superintendent Russ Adams told board members that superintendents of the conference are recommending approval of the requests, primarily to preserve the 10-school make-up of the conference and its scheduling.

Seven school boards must approve the requests to allow the application process to proceed.

Western Christian has also made a formal request, but that was not considered by the MOC-Floyd Valley school board.

George-Little Rock has made a request to be part of the War Eagle Conference.
