Briefs Cougars prep for postseason

The AGWSR Cougars, ranked 12th in Class 1A, went 0-3 at Saturday's Hudson Tournament. They fell to 1A number-eight Don Bosco but picked up the opening set (21-15, 15-21, 9-15). They also got one from Aplington-Parkersburg in another three-set loss (16-21, 21-18, 10-15). They ended the day going three with East Buchanan, winning the first set (21-8, 19-21, 6-15).

Brynn Smith recorded her 1,000th career dig in the tournament.

The losses put the Cougars at 13-24 on the season with the postseason opening on Monday, Oct. 17. The Cougars are slated to host the first three rounds, beginning with West Hancock. The winner sees either North Iowa or Graettinger-Terril-Ruthven-Ayrshire in a Class 1A, Region 3 quarterfinal in Ackley on Oct. 19. That winner goes on to the semifinals to face either Glidden-Ralston, Storm Lake St. Mary's or South O'Brien in Ackley on Oct. 24.

Regional finals will be held at a site to be determined on Oct. 26. The top half of the bracket includes Newell-Fonda, Paton-Churdan, Fort Dodge St. Edmond, Ar-We-Va, Algona bishop Garrigan, Harris-Lake Park, Trinity Christian, and George, Little Rock.

Cougars flip switch

AGWSR improves NICL Tourney result

he AGWSR Cougars won two matches in last year's inaugural North Iowa Cedar League Volleyball Tournament. They won two again this year, but placed two spots higher. The difference was they won Tuesday's opener. They won their final match of the tourney Thursday in Ackley to grab seventh.

AGWSR beat Hudson (25-16, 25-19) and lost to third-ranked in Class 2A Wapsie Valley (12-25, 19-25) Tuesday night. Day two was Thursday in Ackley as they split with a loss to Grundy Center (25-20, 25-19) and a win against South Hardin (15-25, 25-15, 15-11). AGWSR's first day results from a year. This time around, the Cougars won the opener with Brynn Smith leading the charge with 10 kills. Karis Lippert was a perfect 16 of 16 with a pair of aces in serve. The second game was all Wapsie Valley, and the numbers show it. Smith finished with just four kills in the two sets. Lila by Karis Lippert and Tessa Vaughn also dropped in Sperfslage to blow things

four. Lippert only had five turns behind the line, but didn't miss. Trevyn Smith also went through nine serves unblemished.

The Cougars also split placing matches Thursday in Ackley as AGWSR (12th in Class 1A), South Hardin (2A), Grundy Center (10th in 2A) and Sumner-Fredericksburg (9th in 2A) were all there to decide fifth through eight.

AGWSR battled GC, and were as close as 15-14 before the Spartans ultimately pulled away in the first set. They tried to mount a comeback in the second, using four Smith service winners to make it 23-18. GC ultimately won with a sideout.

Game one of the seventh-place match was oddly one-sided, thanks to a quick start that put AGWSR in a 7-1 hole. Alli Sheldahl turned an early sideout into six service points after AGWSR's Brylea Metzgar put down a kill for a 1-0 home lead. SH had the only other service run, a three-pointer by Ava Paige, that made it 20-11. A Cougar error and an ace finished the set. The Cougars flipped things around in the second, getting a fast 8-2 start of their own. The Tigers went on to score just three points in serve in the set. The cougars used a couple two-point runs

Beaubien lead Cadet youth charge

he Iowa Falls-Alden/AGWSR Cadet girls cross country team has quite the system going on right now. Seniors Teah Miller and Abby Harding, already two-time State qualifiers, had two time-Stat medalist Ellie Meyer to learn from. Meyer had had State medalist Aubrie Fisher. Fisher, in turn, had two-time qualifier Bethany Lippert.

Now it's Nakia Ollivierre and Demi Beaubien benefitting from that hierarchy.

The freshman pair have been finishing in the top-10 of almost every race so far this season while leading the Cadets to a State ranking in Class 3A.

Ollivierre has been with AG-WSR for five years, moving outside of Wellsburg from Joint Base Lewis-McChord in Washington with her mothers Rosalie and Emily Martinez. Her father, Julian Ollivierre-Brewer, is a Ranger in the Army.

Ollivierre picked up running just two years ago and has already had a lot of success. On the track she is a 1500 and 800-meter State middle school champion. In cross country she was ranked third in Class 3A just two weeks into the season and has settled into the top-15 since.

But running, she said, was a means to a bigger end. She is already receiving offers from Div. I women's basketball programs as a top-100 recruit while playing for the Missouri Phenom AAU team. She has grown to love running, however.

"I picked up running to help me with basketball," Ollivierre said. "I had no idea that I would love running as much as I do now. This is my first year running cross country. I love the mental challenge of it and that the courses are different. You have to have a lot of self-discipline, be mentally strong and be able to push yourself. I love the anybody and being humble is key to success. I am a firm believer that hard work pays off. Nothing is deserved, it is all earned. I believe that I am having success because I am not afraid to fail. I'm not afraid to put myself out there, push myself and I don't back down from challenges."

When it comes to picking a favorite between cross country and basketball, she said both help her evolve as an athlete and a person.

"Cross country helps me develop mental strength that builds my confidence in basketball," Ollivierre said. "Basketball introduced my competitiveness that won't let me quit in cross country. Both are developing me into the person that I am becoming."

Beaubien only started running regularly last year as an eighth grader. She joined the cross country team in seventh grade, but it didn't take.

"I was quickly overwhelmed and decided to quit," Beaubien said. "After much persuasion, I decided to give it another try the very next year."

Beaubien holds the IF-A middle school 1500-meter record. Now she is part of a Cadet squad that started the season ranked. She has helped the team win two meets with topfive finishes in three others while grabbing three top-10 finishes herself. She added that she prefers cross country's one-and-done racing.

ing. "I would say that I definitely like cross county better because you don't have to worry about having energy left for your next race," Beaubien said. "Also, there's a smaller team for cross-country, so you get to know your teammates on a personal level."

As a freshman, Beaubien said she wasn't expecting the early success she has seen.

"Since we're running with a much larger age range, I wasn't expecting to get in the top-10 at all this season," Beaubien said. "I had only raced in one 5k before, so I didn't have much of an idea what my pace would be. I was originally aiming for anything under 24 minutes, but now I am going to shoot for anything under 22 minutes. My goal for the next three seasons is to run under 21 minutes and hopefully even lower than that after I know what I can do."

Ollivierre won the first two races she ran with the Cadets. She has since won two more, placed fourth in another, and finished 25th in a meet against the best in Class 4A. None of it is a surprise to her.

"I work hard every day," Ollivierre said. "Wanting to outwork my competition is my motivation this season. I don't underestimate Beaubien's senior brother Jase, leader for the Cadet boys, has set a good example for her she said.

Senior Night spoiled

Injuries costly in 42-8 loss to N-P

ames Koop, like most football coaches, doesn't make excuses in the wake of losses. But following AGWSR's 42-10 loss to Nashua-Plainfield in a key Class A, Dist. 3 game, nobody would blame him.

Though he refused to use injuries as an excuse, they were certainly reasons.

"I don't know if we had a turnover before our team doctor Dr. Sperfslage had to put a M.A.S.H. unit together," Koop said. "It was a tough, physical ball game against a physical team, but we were matching them. Those are three two-way starters we lost for significant time. I'm not making excuses. All of the guys on our team work hard, but there's a difference between our top-15 and the rest. There were times tonight that we had to dip beyond the 15."

Those three linemen, Eli Kuper and Jared Granzow missed a half, and leading rusher Kaden Abbas was on and off the field throughout the contest. That caused a ripple effect as tight end Ben Puente went for that spot down to guard, which he hasn't played since early last year.

Abbas' injuries had the first effect on the game. He is the long snapper and was getting looked at when AGWSR punt-

came on a nine-yard Bo Harrington pass to Tucker Franzen to make it 22–8.

N-P first scored on a three-yard run by Titus Evans early in the first quarter. AGWSR responded early in the second with a one-yard dive by Abbas, who added the point-after run to give the Cougars an 8-6 lead.

Punts by both followed before the Cougars fumbled the ball away on the N-P 20. Three plays later, the Huskies used a 10yard Aiden Geiner run and a two-point conversion to take the lead at 14-8.

That was the first of six Cougar turnovers. The second came after N-P opened the third quarter with a 41-yard Harrington run and two-pointer. This one resulted directly into a score when Evans stepped in front of a Bo Gerbracht pass and returned it 35 yards for a score and a 36-8 Huskie lead.

AGWSR third turnover, another fumble, came late in the third at the visitor 14. N-P ended the verse at the Cougar 39. The scoring ended on a 35-yard Harrington throw to Trae Geise on the third play in the fourth.

The Cougars fumbled two more times and were intercepted on their final three possessions. \bullet
