Following an interview process that included six candidates three internal and three external the school district has announced the hiring of Eric Walkingstick, who has spent the last 12 years coaching at Akron-Westfield.

His overall coaching record is 132-

Walkingstick was at IFAHS Friday morning and held a meet and greet with his new players. He said supporters of the program can expect to see a lot of passion and excitement on the sidelines.

"I like to be bring passion and excitement to the game. Offensively, we throw it around quite a lot and we run some funky formations. It will be a fun style to watch," Walkingstick said.

The new IF-A coach has some interesting ties to the Scenic City. His son Cade is a quarterback on the current Ellsworth Community College football roster, and last summer, he coached in the Shrine Bowl with current Humboldt Coach - and former Cadet assistant - Derrick Elman.

"From the looks of it, there are plenty of things in place to make this a good program. If you can't get amped up for that, then why are you coaching?" Walkingstick said. tendent at Iowa Falls and Alden - said there were multiple candidates worthy of the job, but the committee's recommendation was clear that Walkingstick was the top choice.

What stood out to me was the survey feedback indicated everyone wanted a positive culture. We are really getting someone who will grow the program and have positive interactions. Building up the kids was important," Neumann said. "A lot of candidates had that quality but he stood out the most. He's an experienced head coach and has a proven track record of having teams that have good numbers out for football."

Walkingstick replaces Don Anderson, who wrapped up a seven-year stint with an overall record of 26-39. Anderson was hired in 2016 to replace current athletic director Pat Norem. The latter compiled a 44-66 mark.

Anderson's best two seasons included six-win campaigns in both 2019 and 2021.

Last season, the Cadets finished

with a 2-7 record in Class 2A District 7, but still qualified for the playoffs by earning the fourth spot in the district. They lost to eventual state champion Central Lyon/

George Little Rock in the first round. Neumann said the process began with the district putting out a survey to parents, community members, players and coaches within the program. From those results, the administration created feedback forms and selected a committee of 18 people to participate in the coaching interviews. That group did not include school administra-

The 18 individuals were split into two roups and the committee members had

nine categories where they were asked to rate how effective the candidate would be in that particular area. The six candidates rotated through those two groups and also spoke to a third group which was solely made up of school administrators. Neumann said the administration team did not rate the candidates.

"We created a spreadsheet and looked at all the comments they (committee) provided," Neumann said. "Again, it was pretty obvious who the committee liked, so we went with the feedback we received."

Neumann said Walkingstick will be teaching in the Iowa Falls Community School District this fall.

ECC athlete leads SH middle school

ateo Martinez is making the most out of a disappointing situation. The Ellsworth Community College sophomore was one of four players that Bryan Bender retained on the roster from the previous year. However, he suffered an injury towards the end of his freshman season and could no longer play the sport

he loved. Instead of walking away from the game altogether, he obtained his coaching certification and is in the midst of his first job as the South Hardin

Middle School basketball coach. "I missed playing," he said. "It was another way for me to stay a little bit closer to the

game." Originally from Clarion, Martinez wanted to stay closer to home. After looking at a few other junior colleges, he chose ECC. When former coach Troy Muilenburg left, Martinez had another decision to make - should he stay in the Scenic City to play under a new coach?

At the end of his freshman year and in the middle of all the changes, Martinez broke his tibia but attemped to continue playing.

When Bender started in April, he met with all of the players on campus. Martinez told him he knew he wouldn't wanted to get into coaching. That was his main reason for staying with the program, to learn from Bender. During preseason, Martinez ended up needing surgery and had a metal rod placed in his leg ending his days on the court prematurely.

"What makes him a good coach is he's a good person. He's a good leader and he loves basketball. He loves what coaching entails," said Bender. "Giving back to the kids, it's about the kids. He enjoys the competitiveness of it. When you can't play anymore, you get your competitive fix in different ways, and I think that is how

he is filling his bucket." The opportunity to coach came faster than he thought with everything falling into place. Assistant Panthers coach Dwayne Melton had led the Tiger middle school program the year before. When Melton took the job on Bender's staff, there was an opening. The two coaches presented the idea to their athlete and then talked to the SHMS principal. Over the holiday break Martinez got his coaching authorization through the college.

"I was eager for the job, so I think they (SHMS administration) thought I was pretty determined," Martinez said. "I really focused on making it clear that I wanted to help the kids not just be better at basketball, but be better young men and continue to learn things outside of playing as well as being good students."

got good grades and finishing with a winning season. With the schedule winding down, he has met those goals so far.

Martinez admitted he was worried in the beginning. Taking on his first coaching job while still in college, he wasn't sure how the athletes would respond to him. The first day he stepped into the gym in Hubbard, he knew he was in the right place.

"The kids are amazing and really bought in to everything I taught them," he said. "They

listen very well and respect me, and I respect them. The age difference, it's not really a big deal. It's not noticed. I don't think it matters. But in the beginning, I was definitely worried how they would take it."

At the start of the season, Martinez was fresh out of surgery and on crutches. He wasn't able to show them the skills he was teaching. As the season has gone on, he has progressively gotten better.

"I try to stay as active as I can in practice, I do

drills with them, I play defense against them, sometimes I even do ball handling with them. It just keeps me active and keeps my leg moving and it's really helpful," he said. "I was pretty down after my surgery, because I wasn't able to play this season. As soon as this job came, I was thrilled, I was excited to just be back with a basketball in my hand, back in a gym and just doing what I love."

Ellsworth Community College traveled to Northeast Community College and the visitors took care of business in an 82-51

In the first half, a Saliou Seye bucket and freebie knotted the game at 10-all before Jordan Glenn-Hawkins drained one of his six three-pointers to give the visitors the lead. They went on



a 13-0 run and the lead quickly swelled to 24-points at the break. In the second half, NECC (12-13, 3-9) never broke the 20-point barrier created in the first 20 minutes.

Defensively, ECC (18-6, 7-5) held the Hawks to just 28 percent shooting from the floor. The hosts were 3-20 from downtown. The Panthers were 40 percent shooting on the night and used their length to nab 55 rebounds.

The Panthers had a huge game from their bench as they tallied 63 points. Glenn-Hawkins was 6-7 of seven from long-range and finished with a game-high 20-points. Shawn Fulcher was also in double figures with 14 points.

ECC (4-18, 1-11) found itself in a hole they could not climb out of, falling 90-47 and dropping their seventh game in a row.

The Hawks (13-9, 6-6) opened the game on a 10-0 run. The Panthers did not get on the board until midway through the first

It was 19-12 after the opening period and that would be the closest the two would get. NECC would go on another run in the second period and build a 23-point advantage at the half (47-24). The hosts outscored ECC 43-23 in the second half.

The biggest discrepancies came from the turnover column. The Panthers turned it over

22 times, while the Hawks just had eight. The Panthers will host the highly ranked both women and men – Kirkwood today (Saturday). ■

Weaver finished with a team-high 15 points, while Bicknese added 10 in the road loss. The Cadets closed the regular season with Humboldt Friday.
