

"I called one of the fair directors and asked if this was something I could do. I went to a fair board meeting and pitched the idea. They said go ahead and put me into the schedule."

Each year the response to the event has been great with new people participatThey really like it," Nicole Russell, Grace and Thomas' mother, said. "It is fun to see them interact with other kids and learn something else from kids that are their age that are doing things they wouldn't normally do."

Work begins to organize the Friendship Livestock Show in the spring. DeBruin starts to gather volunteers and sponsors along with getting the word out to those who might want to participate.

"It worked out super well the first year and we've been doing it every since," De-Bruin said. "I just seems to magically fold together at the fair, everyone shows up to help out."


Jasper County At-Large Director Reed Hiemstra was one of the people who tracked
