Jasper County teams with IDALS for soil and water improvement projects

Landowners interested are encouraged to call Soil and Water Conservation District

The Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship formed a formal agreement with Jasper County last week that will effectively kickstart the search for bioreactor and saturat-

ed buffers projects between farm fields and local watersheds in an effort to protect water quality and reduce nutrient loss in soil.

Jasper County Supervisor Brandon Talsma said IDALS has been trying to

work with landowners to implement

soil conservation and edge-of-field

practices. But participation has been slim. By forming a 28E agreement with the county, Talsma said the hope is to get more landowners and farmers on board.

Using the county as a government

entity and doing what IDALS calls

"batch-and-build projects," landown-

ers do not have to worry about finding contractors to install bioreactors or saturated buffers. The county is not running the program, but will instead use its bid processes to find the con-

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
