Equipment available for use includes an assault runner treadmill, assault bike — airdyne style, ski erg — cross country ski style exercise, functional fitness trainer cable machine, concept 2 rower and pull up bars. At the facility there are also medicine balls, resistance bands, battle ropes, kettlebells, sand bags, Bulgarian bags, push sleds and BOSU balls.

For those who might be intimidated by walking through the door at a gym, Downing has advice on how to get started.

"People have the mindset

that I need to get in shape before a join a gym. That is why we have classes, there are all different levels," Downing said. "When someone comes in they can state that they don't have a lot of experience so we really try to break it down and teach. There are no trick exercises, there are no top secret routines, it is just form."

Opening the center is coming

home for Downing. He started has career almost 30 years ago with the school district.

"The first athletes that I ever trained were at PCM High School in 1994," Downing said. "I'm an exercise science guy for the last 29 years. The contest itself –


