Hinson Tours New Protivin Fire Station

PROTIVIN - With the completion of the community's new fire station, the Protivin Volunteer Fire Department hosted one of its most prominent backers.

After Rep. Ashley Hinson signaled out the fire station building project for her personal backing, the Protivin Fire Station got a major boost.

Thursday saw Hinson visit the fruits of that effort as the station opened its doors for a tour.

Completion of the new station has been just in time for a busy season, as dry weather recently has upped the fire risk

"We had three calls in one day," said Fire Chief Brad Moudry about a recent Friday's work.

Responding to a spate of recent fire calls has been made a bit easier as the department has moved out of its former quarters and into newer digs.

Noting the trucks in the new bays, Moudry pointed out the sheer quantity of space today.

"Now, we've got room, so we can actually walk around 'em," said Moudry. More room for vehicles,







meeting space and even individual lockers are now available.

Helicopter Landing Pad Coming up, more is

planned. The fire department has been approached about using the station for voting,

for example. Right now, the department is leery about that given the possibility of a fire call, but the department is also eyeing what to do with

the former hall. As the City of Protivin lacks a city shop, the department might consider renting out the old station, said

Moudry. Paving of an area behind the fire station to make a helicopter landing pad is

planned. That work should be completed before the end of the year, allowing a greater cooperation with emergen-

cy response. Moudry also pointed to the generator presence at the fire station.

In case of a power failure in the community, the station can continue to operate.

Loft space is currently unfinished, but Moudry said walls could easily be installed to finish off the

Ag Land Cash Rents

The average for cash rents for agricultural land in Iowa is at the highest ever recorded, worrying experts who fear what this could mean for Iowa's farm-

Results form the Cash Rental Rates for Iowa 2023 Survey were released by Iowa State University Extension showing a spike of nine percent in a single year, averaging \$279 per acre.

That is 3.3 percent greater than the 2013 total, the previous record when rent was \$270 per acre.

Nearly all Iowa counties saw rents increase with just eight counties not seeing an increase.

Medium-rate land was up 8.6 percent, rising to \$277 from \$255 while high-rated land rose 11.1 percent to #330 from \$297 per acre.

While rents are up, farm income projections do not look as strong with income expected to drop.

The numbers are worrisome, especially for young farmers trying to break into the business.
