with two physicians who presented a unique staffing model to CMH. We began seriously exploring this staffing model with those physicians, but unfortunately for CMH, they were able to obtain the same schedule in their current location and chose to stay employed in that location," Everding stated. "Although we were not able to recruit these two physicians, the decision was made to move forward with the same staffing model and work with a national recruiting firm to begin the recruitment process in late December."

The schedule model is two-fold to allow CMH to provide coverage in the CMH Medical Clinic and also provide coverage in the emergency room 24 hours a day by a CMH-employed physician. Over the past two years, Everding commented CMH has been utilizing locums/traveling emergency department physicians. The new model will involve hiring a minimum of two physicians to cover seven days in a row for 24-hour shifts and have a rest period of 14 days.

The seven "work" days will involve five days 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in the clinic seeing patients followed by overnight coverage in the emergency room Monday through Friday and coverage of a full weekend in the emergency

"This is a unique and different model This will include a three-week rotation of physicians in a similar manner and will result in providing two physician options to establish care in the clinic with. CMH is also recruiting for an emergency department physician that will assist with coverage in the third week of the rotation," Everding expressed. "Dr. Brinkman will continue to cover one weekend a month and we will continue to have coverage from the current CMH providers that are already working in that capacity. How will this work? Can a physician really remain 'awake' for seven days straight? This model is not ideal for all hospital and clinic settings. This schedule is also not meant for all providers.

"When we began researching the possibility of moving to this model, a primary focus centered on the average number of emergency room visits in a year at CMH. The 'average' number of visits in a year has been around four per

day, which means that there could be days with 10–12 and some days with zero, but the overall average is four per day. We closely reviewed the timing of the visits and found that on average, there is a substantial decrease in the number of visits every day of the week from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. As we have presented this data to our potential candidates, they have expressed that this is a manageable schedule and the attraction to more 'work-life' balance being a major benefit to the schedule.'

Everding explained each physician

patients and work closely with those patients to provide quality care. This model will provide patients the opportunity to choose between two providers as their primary care physician (PCP). The providers' schedules will allow patients to schedule appointments for wellness visits, physicals, follow-up visits and management of chronic care.

Each physician will also have time in their daily schedules for same day or "acute" visits (sore throat, earache, etc.) that are not "planned" visits. The physicians who fill these positions will also be working five days each week to have scheduling available the full week they are covering. If a health need arises for anyone during a week their PCP is not in the clinic, there will be options available to be seen by other providers in the clinic, which is like how it has been even when Buchholz was in the clinic.

Everding added CMH has recruited and signed Dr. Lonny Miller for the hospital and they are in the process of fulfilling all the paperwork required to get him activated as an "in-network" provider. The goal is to have him begin work at CMH in late May or early June.

Regarding operational highlights for 2022, Everding explained while there was a decline in COVID-19 cases, the number of inpatient and skilled patient days increased from 650 in 2021 to 950 in 2022. There has continued to be a decrease in the number of COVID-19 cases that were hospitalized and treated on an outpatient basis throughout the year. The number has decreased and remained steady in most recent months and continues to linger even now with "one off" positive cases being hospitalized or treated.

Other areas which showed substantial increases in volume in 2022 in comparison to 2021 include lab, increase of 17.4 percent with an increase of 11,587 tests; emergency department, increase of 14.1 percent or 221 visits; and clinic, which also includes Fredericksburg, 36.6 percent with a total increase of 5,037 visits with 4,915 in Fredericksburg.

Everding reported on service pin recipients for 2022, including Tina Hansen and Sue Blue, 25 years; Susie Meyer, 20 years; Laurie Schissel, 15 years; Susan Lantzky, Julie Kleman and Kara Schulmeister, 10 years; and Dr. Lucas Brinkman and Mary Michels, five years.

Deb Toenges provided an update on CMH Auxiliary and Friends of CMH as she is the chairperson of both. She explained Friends of CMH is the gifting arm of the hospital and provides support to CMH in a variety of ways. The organization focused on raising funds for an upgrade to equipment in the surgical department throughout 2022 and will continue into 2023. Friends of CMH also helped fund a va-

desires to develop their own panel of riety of smaller projects at the hospital and received and wrote grants to provide more funding to CMH. Last year, Friends of CMH received 589 monetary donations of \$79,000 and seven in-kind donations of \$6,500.

> Toenges also provided a brief update on the CMH Auxiliary and explained they held a variety of fundraisers throughout 2022 and have several planned for 2023. They had a balance brought forward of \$1,579 and \$9,478 in receipts. There was \$7,527 in disbursements, which left them with a balance of \$5,065.

> Hillcrest Living provisional administrator Beth Diers updated the group on "whirlwind" of 2022. She stated it is a challenging time for nursing homes as 17 closed in Iowa last year, and thanks to the hard work, perseverance and dedication of the staff, Hillcrest remains strong. In May 2022, Amber Brady was named acting administrator when Hillcrest was deemed in financial duress, taking out loans to pay recurring bills and payroll. Diers commented prior to Brady, money had been gong missing from operation funds and credit cards.

> "After a few short months, all of Hillcrest administration stepped forward to turn the ship in the right direction with a lot of hard work and dedication," Diers stated.

> Diers became provision administrator in August 2022 and hit the ground running with many changes. Hillcrest opened its doors in August with the help of AcuShield kiosks, and the financial planning was moved back to Sumner. An employee assistant program was implemented for times of stress, a new minivan was purchased with fundraising money and resident bathrooms were remodeled.

Hillcrest has been able to increase its nursing home census by over 11 percent. The daily average census in the nursing home in 2022 was 46.9 residents per day and in 2023 it is 53 residents per day. There is 100 percent occupancy in independent living and around 90 percent occupancy in assisted living, with 14.5 tenants per day in 2022 and 15.4 in 2023.

Diers reported a \$362,931 overall loss in 2022, which is much better than the \$1.5 million budgeted loss. She commented the biggest financial turnaround happened midway through the year. The biggest expense in 2022 was agency staffing for \$600,000, and Hillcrest was able to reduce food costs by \$10,000 by "getting creative with sourcing methods.'

"I want to thank the board for having faith in my abilities during this time of change to lead Hillcrest to a greater and brighter future," Diers concluded.

Keith Niemann provided an update on the Hillcrest Foundation as the new chairman of the board. He took over last year following the retirement of

Dale Lehmkuhl from the board after over 30 years.

Regarding the financial report, the foundation began 2022 with a starting balance of \$309,488. There were \$10,310 in contributions throughout the year and \$277,100 in distributions, leaving \$40,690 at the end of 2022. As of February 2023, Niemann commented there was a balance of \$40,990.

"With the COVID years behind us, hopefully now all we have to deal with is the stock market, which as we know has not been great lately. It is my hope it will settle and grow again as history has shown," Niemann stated. "I'd like to thank the board members on with me and the Hillcrest board itself for believing in us. We have a lot of work to do, but we have come a long way."

SEMS vice president Deb Schnadt reported the year the emergency service had in 2022. She commented there were 375 calls with 74 percent as Medicaid and 26 percent Medicare or private insurance. In 2023 there have been 65 calls, and in 2021 there were 485 calls.

"SEMS has taken a new approach when covering calls as we no longer have any full-time employees and are relying on crew to come when paged. We were forced to go this route due to cash flow as expenses increase and income has not," Schnadt explained.

Purchases in 2022 included two Stryker power cots through Support SEMS and community donations for \$62,000. SEMS is looking to replace two aged heart monitors for \$50,000 this year, as well as update an ambulance. Schnadt added a few grants have been secured and they are working on several more. Copies of the 2022 financials were not available as they had not been completed.

"We are thankful for the community support both financially and with our crew. We are working to make sure SEMS is around for many years to come," Schnadt stated.
