3. Applicants must submit a façade improvement grant application, along with cost estimates from a contractor, detailing the work to be done. Applications will be accepted until July 31, at which time all submitted applications would be reviewed, approved and money distributed accordingly. Applicant would have six months to complete work. Any work completed in 2023 would also be eligible.

4. Work is expected to be completed and bills submitted within six months of the grant award date. A complete copy of bills from expenses relating to the project must be presented to the Sumner's Future, Inc. board before the

grant money will be distributed. The project by the Sumner's Future, Inc. executive board will be conducted before the grant payment is made. Any deviations from the approved application may disqualify the applicant.

5. Receipt of any grant monies will be a current business investor who actively supports and/or participates in the programs and activities of Sumner's Future, Inc.

"I was in the Army during that time and saw many guys come back looking really rough. You walk by someone, and they'd jump at you, they were so skittish and jumpy. It was sad to see," Burgart expressed. "I saw the Vietnam Memorial when it was in Sumner, but seeing the real thing in Washington, D.C. was something else. I was partial to the Vietnam Memorial because of those experiences in the Army."

It was a lot of walking for the father and son pair as they visited the National Mall, but they enjoyed the nice weather which made the trip perfect. Their tour guide then took them past the White House and the Pentagon while on their way to their next stop, which was Arlington National Cemetery, which was Burgart's favorite part of the entire trip.

"Our tour guide was really nice and told us a lot of stuff about the places we saw. It made the experience better having them on the buses and explaining things to us from place to place," he added. "My favorite part of the trip was the changing of the guard. It was really interesting to see the process. It was completely silent and the guy in charge made sure of it. It was amazing to see.

"The cemetery was huge with over 40,000 people buried there. When you look one direction, the graves were lined up and you looked a different direction and they were still all lined up. It's a once-in-alifetime trip," he explained. "Unfortunately your spouse can't go with you, but it's nice to have someone else there with you. I enjoyed getting to take the trip with my son.'

Burgart was enlisted in the Army from 1971 to 1973. He took basic training and advanced training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. He was trained in heavy equipment, compressors, track drills and dynamite.

"I was stationed in Fort Benning, Ga., and we were ready and on alert for Vietnam. Our trucks were packed and we were set to take off to South Carolina and get on a ship when they called it off. That was pretty good timing," he added.

Burgart lives in Sumner with his wife Mary. They have three children, Dan, Jessica and Cory, one grandchild and one great-grandchild.
