Sandwiches Made Right unexpectedly closes its doors, then reopens

An ambitious owner steps down, an angry community speculates and a mystery man keeps restaurant in business

Closed. Gone fishing.

That is what the marquee said early last week inside Sandwiches Made Right, a restaurant that has been serving Newton customers for almost 100 years. The doors were locked, the lights off. No one sat at the front counter watching staff

prepare the loose meat sandwiches, known colloquially as Maid-Rites.

All the while the community was left wondering what happened. For all they knew, business was good. Anybody who passed a glance at the restaurant on any given day would see the place packed with people, or the drive-thru window traffic backed up into the 200 block of First Avenue West. Speculation over why the restaurant closed soon found its way online, leading many to point fingers without full knowledge of what really happened. To make matters worse, a customer complained of a bad experience at the restaurant shortly before it closed, which only fed into the wild theories.


