City and Wernimonts working to reach solution in zoning conflict

The City of Carroll is currently grappling with its own zoning ordinances to allow Dick and Collin Wernimont to construct a 15,000-squarefoot mixed-purpose shop on their land north of Carroll.

Part of the Wernimont's property, including the spot on which the shop would stand, is within a two-mile area outside Carroll, where the city governs the planning and zoning regulations as part of an agreement with Carroll County.

Because the manufacturing of parts for agricultural equipment does not fall into the agricultural uses approved by Carroll's comprehensive plan, the Wernimonts' building permit was denied.

Collin Wernimont said they first applied for a building

permit in October. He currently works out of Audubon to cut raw materials, then form steel plates with a press brake, before they are welded into a manifold in a shop located next to Dick Wernimont's residence.

After parts are assembled, they are shipped to Jefferson to be painted, then to Paton to be built into John Deere's DB Series Planters.

DickWernimont also welds in Carroll, and building the shop would allow them to consolidate their efforts into one location.

Collin Wernimont said a family friend working as an architect advised them to apply for spot rezoning, which would reclassify the parcel of land as an industrial zone, allowing for the Wernimonts to build the shop.

Owners Cory and Missy Handlos said they never had lifelong plans to own a restaurant, but saw a need for a place like Wasted Grain in Carroll, seizing the opportunity when Bloomers Bar and Grill came up

"It's a good opportunity and the community needs it," Cory Handlos said. "We think it's a good opportunity for everybody, for Carroll and the surrounding communities."

Wasted Grain is planning soft openings in the next few weeks, with an official opening date to be determined.

Purchasing the former Bloomers building located at 1235 Plaza Drive in Carroll back in February, owners say renovations couldn't have gone smoother. The space has been completely transformed and updated, with a new exterior, decor, furniture, floors, lighting, bar, bathrooms, a new and bigger kitchen, plus more.

Wasted Grain Manager Wendi Fagan says the new restaurant's mission isn't just about fulfilling a need in Carroll, but also to offer something you can't find anywhere else.

Wasted Grain will offer a menu with complete with American comfort food, offering items such as steaks and appetizers, shooting for elevated quality and taste.

'It's not going to be your typical run of the mill, fried frozen appetizers," Fagan said. "The atmosphere alone just speaks for itself. On top of it, I think the menu is going to be kind of a surprise to people as far as what we can offer."

While the look is more sleek and modern, patrons are still welcome to grab a bite to eat in sweatpants,
