on family's 1912 Fergus me to h

By DARCY DOUGHERTY MAULSBY LAURENS – In 1912, an iceberg sank the "practically unsinkable" Titanic, Iowa recorded its coldest-ever temperature at Washta (minus 47 degrees that January), and George Ferguson built an attractive, new barn and corn crib in Pocahontas County north of Laurens.

"As you look at the walls and roof, it's amazing how these old barns were built," said Terry Ferguson, who noted that George was a cousin of her husband, Craig's, grandfather.

This barn was built in the midst of America's golden age of agriculture (which spanned roughly 1897-1918). As America's urban population expanded in the early 1900s, demand for farm products grew. Iowa farming shifted from subsistence agriculture to a major business enterprise defined by high levels of production, strong commodity prices and major investments in farm improvements.

Ceramic blocks offered a durable building option for barns in this era. The blocks were also larger than conventional bricks, which helped reduce construction time. Unique features of the Ferguson's barn, which originally housed dairy cows and draft horses, include the curved block on the corners, and the haymow that is anchored with iron that's visible on the outside

There's still a center hay-drop door in the haymow, although some parts of the barn have been modified. Cement feeders in the alley that once fed dairy cows remain, although gutters in the floor were filled with cement in the 1960s.

When Craig's father, Marvin, raised hogs in the barn, steps to the haymow could be pulled up by a chain.

While the barn also housed sheep in years past, it has been used for raising beef cattle, too. Ferguson and her husband, Craig, who have lived on this Century Farm in Swan Lake Township since 1978, have four horses, including American paint horses and quarter horses, that live in the barn today.

The couple has worked hard to maintain the barn. Around 2003, a bad windstorm ripped off the cupola. "A guy by Marathon had a similar cupola, so we traded my hus-

band's Honda motorcycle for it," Ferguson said.

son Construction of Marathon to re-roof the barn.

The cupola was also replaced, and the



barn was painted and tuckpointed, plus the foundation was stabilized.

Barns have long been important to Ferguson, who grew up on a farm near Sac

"I liked the barn on that farm," said Ferguson, a family and consumer sciences teacher at Storm Lake High School. "Unfortunately, a tornado destroyed that barn around 1970."

The Fergusons' barn was included on the Iowa Barn Foundation's All-State Barn tour for the first time in 2004. Visitors got to see the barn and the distinctive 'conehead" corncrib nearby.

"The corncrib originally had a rounded roof, but when it needed repairs in the 1960s, the contractor installed the pointed roof," Ferguson said.

Through the years, the barn and corncrib have been featured on a number of Iowa Barn Foundation tours, which attract visitors from across Iowa, as well as other states. The Ferguson's barn was mentioned in a travel article in the Los Angeles Times about the 2015 All-State Barn Tour.

As time has passed, the barn's exterior wood no longer holds paint. The couple plans to cover this area with steel siding. "The barn has evolved through the years, and we want to keep it in good shape,' Ferguson said.

Around 2003-2004, they hired Simp-

FD man arrested for arson

kwingert@messengernews.net A man who was arrested following a vacant house fire in Fort Dodge on Wednesday has been charged with second-degree arson.

Jonathan L. Shutt, 36, of Fort Dodge, was arrested following the Wednesday afternoon fire at 605 S. 14th St.

The Fort Dodge Fire Department responded to the fire reported shortly before 3 p.m. When they arrived, smoke was coming out of the basement and the upper floors of the house. Firefighters found the fire in the basement and quickly extinguished it. No injuries were reported.

According to FDFD Chief Steve Hergenreter, the basement sustained fire damage and there was smoke throughout the rest of the house.

Neighbors saw two men fleeing the house at the time of the fire and the two men were located and detained by Fort Dodge police officers nearby.

Shutt was ultimately arrested and charged with second-degree arson, a Class C felony. He is being held at the Webster County Jail on a \$10,000 cash/surety bond. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Jan. 6, 2023.

Suspicious Facebook posts could be scams

kwingert@messengernews.net You're scrolling through Facebook when you come upon a collection of photos of a sweet puppy and the poster says they found the animal wandering around and want to reunite it with the owner, so they ask to have the post shared across social media.

It seems innocent enough, but in reality it could be setting you up for online danger down the road.

Recently, fake posts have been popping up on Facebook groups dedicated to Fort Dodge area residents buying and selling items. These posts, upon first glance, seem genuine – a parent searching for their child who didn't return home after school, or a good samaritan who brought in a dog stuck out in the cold, or even of a citizen warning neighbors of a potential thief.


Instead, they're hoaxes and scams that are potentially setting up the users who share them for more scams, according to a local cyber crime expert.

Webster County Sheriff's Detective Alex Winninger with the Fort Dodge/Webster County Cyber Crimes Unit warns against falling victim to these fake posts.

While the hoax posts themselves don't do much, the act of Facebook users sharing the post can set them up as targets for further scamming, Winninger said.


"They're basically trying to see who's going to be more vulnerable to other scams, and there's so many out there," he said.

These scam posts usually have

several red flags, Winninger said. Often, they're made using accounts that were created just hours prior, or from accounts not based in the area. Another red flag is when a Facebook user shares a post looking to reunite a pet or a child with its family, but they turn off the comments on the post, making it more difficult to get in touch with who they're looking for.

Most of these posts include photos as well. Another way to verify the veracity of the post is to do a reverse Google image search to see where the photo came from. Typically, the photo will have been posted in multiple places before and likely be unrelated to the circumstances claimed in the post.

Winninger recommends social media users report these suspicious posts to the social media platform when they see them. While law enforcement might not necessarily be able to do anything, the social media platform can remove the post and ban the user who posted it.

In the case of posts purporting

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
