For the Shugars, collecting is all in the family



Thile he didn't know it at the time, Larry Shugar's first toy – a 1955 Farmall 400 given to him by his father – Bill, began his enthusiasm for farm toys. Over the years, his collection of tractors has grown and changed.

A farmer and a trucker his entire life, Shugar's obsession began with a passion for restoring fullsize tractors. In the 1980s his collection morphed to those of a size more manageable. Before long, his collection filled the top of the kitchen cupboards, and beyond.

you'd like to see it," Larry began. "You're gonna want to see it."

The story goes that dad could get \$200 off the purchase if he picked up the tractor in Moline, and drive it back to Ackley, towing an H for another farmer.

"And that's just what he did," Larry grins. "It took hours, just Dad and another guy – each towing another tractor for the implement. They got their \$200 off!"

The tractor has been in the family since then. More recently, the old M was restored by Larry's son-in-law Trent Winters. But there's more...

"We got to the seat, and I was going to order a new one. But Johnny wouldn't let me," Larry said. "He looked me right in the eye and told me, 'Grandpa wore that seat out." And Johnny was so adamant about it, Larry realized he was right. And so the beautiful new paint job is accented with a seat, worn out from the hours that his father, Johnny's grandfather, had sat upon it in the fields.

That same tractor, after restoration, was given back to Bill on Father's Day – a few years before he passed. While Bill could no longer get on the tractor, he did shed a tear or two of happiness to see 'Emma' as he called her, back to looking new.... other than that old seat!

While Shugar says he farms with 'green', he collects 'red' and that does make sense – when you consider that old M.

Shugar will have his collection, tucked gently inside the trailer, in Ackley for Sunday's festivities of Sauerkraut Days. He invites everyone to stop by, take a look, and share a story or two while you look. Some of his duplicate toys will be brought along, you can dicker with him on what it might cost to take them off his hands.

While Larry collects the 1/16 scale, Johnny has his own collection in his Ackley home. The younger Shugar focuses on the 1/32 scale. He's been doing so

for the past 38 years with his collection getting its start at his dad and grandfather's sides as they visited implements in Marshalltown and Wellsburg and far beyond.

"My first was a set from Grandpa," Johnny began. "I never opened it," he said. "They told me I should keep them in the package." He added that if he'd opened it, he wouldn't know the dates of the tractors in the package.

"It wasn't too hard to leave them in there," he laughed.

A few years ago, he was able to add the same tractors in a slightly different package when they were re-issued by the toy company, and he's pretty proud of both sets. The sets are two of his most treasured pieces in the group.

He estimates there are over 1,000 miniatures which line the shelves and display cases in his home. Johnny says that many were added during visits to farm stores, and he enjoys adding to the collection as often as he can.

Johnny credits Bob Spencer of Faulkner for some of his collection, including many of the cases he displays them in – old Timex[®] watch cases line his dining room, each full to the brim with his many tractors.

He and his dad also took a road trip to purchase an oak china cabinet, complete with lights, to show off those 'parked' inside.

Along with the many tractors in his collection, Johnny has included some tractor prints, farm play sets, skid loaders, trailers and additions like miniature grain bins and various pieces of machinery. And because of his father's trucking business, there are a few semis tossed in for good measure. If it has to do with farming, it's included.

Those who know Johnny understand that he has a memory that doesn't quit. He can identify each tractor in his collection and can tell you where he got it. His collection includes replicas of tractors back to those manufactured from 1892 to current models.

One would expect Johnny to collect tractors, expanding his collection to include a few of the larger scale models, like his father collects. But why did he choose the smaller scale?

"Well, he knows he'll end up with my collection, someday," Larry laughs. "Why have duplicates?

As for Johnny, he hopes that will be a long, long time from now.

The City of Steamboat Mayor Tim Stearns, the rules **L** Rock has approved a new ordinance regarding ATV/ UTV use in city limits with a vote of four council members in favor of the change and one against. Councilman Adam Blackburn was the single vote against the change.

In the most simple terms, as presented in the June issue of [•]Friendly Valley Times' by for riders within city limits are "Follow all traffic rules, stop at stop signs, don't exceed the posted speed limit, don't go down alleys that are not access to your own property, stay off the multiuse trails, keep noise levels down, get your machine registered, and pay attention to the age and driver's license restrictions."



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Fish kill in Hampton under investigation

DNR officials are asking for the public's help in determining the cause of a fish kill discovered June 1, along Squaw Creek in the Franklin County town of Hampton.

A local angler reported dead fish in Squaw Creek in East Park in Hampton. The DNR investigated and found that the fish kill extended approximately 1.5 miles upstream through the town of Hampton.

No definitive source of the kill has been identified, though the DNR is continuing to investigate. Any information or tips from the public with knowledge of a possible cause are requested to contact the DNR's environmental field office in Mason City at 641-424-4073.

Swim warning already in effect

Swimming is not rec-ommended at the beaches of two state parks after weekly tests recently showed they have potentially unsafe concentrations of bacteria, according to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.

One of them — at the lower lake of Pine Lake State Park in Hardin County — had about triple the bacteria concentration of last week, when it was also subject to the swim warning.

Those concentrations n change significantly over the course of days. The test at Pine Lake happened on May 30. The other beach with a swim warning this week is at Prairie Rose State Park in Shelby County. A test there on May 31 revealed a bacteria concentration that was six times the state's

safety threshold, and it was slightly higher than Pine Lake's concentration

Two beaches that had warnings last week had little or no detectable bacteria this week. Those were at Union Grove State Park in Tama County and Lake Keomah State Park in Mahaska County.

A beach at Lake Darling State Park has had detectable amounts of blue-green algae toxins the past two weeks, but they diminished this week and are less than half of the safety threshold that would trigger a swimming warning

Total expenses were \$2.6 million and favorable to budget by \$179,000, and up from the prior year, mostly due to contract labor. April total labor cost, including benefits, was \$1.2 million, and right on budget. However, contract labor was \$140,000 and unfavorable to budget by \$95,000. Efforts continue in recruitment in the Emergency Room, Med/Surg and Radiology.

Accounts receivables were up \$747,000 and self-pay accounts receivables increased \$146,000 from March, due to challenges in the collections process. The hospital's new financial tool, Access, will help with that. The monthly net income was down \$43,399 for the month, and \$690,108 year to date.






