Freeze drying is defined as "A low temperature dehydration process that involves freezing the product and lowering pressure, removing the ice by sublimation. This is in contrast to dehydration by most conventional methods that evaporate water using heat."

By being freeze dried, candies and other products change in texture and size from the change in moisture. This in turn creates a
