ORANGE CITY — On Sunday, January 15 twelve students from Meijigakuin Higashimurayama High School in Tokyo, Japan, traveled to Orange City to begin a three week stay at Northwestern College for a Winter English Program.

The program, returning for the first time after the last class of 2020, is lead by the new Associate Director of Intercultural Development, Kelsey Joseph. Joseph is a 2014 graduate of Northwestern college and has a degree in Social Work. Kevin McMahan previously held this position, and retired last spring.

The director is responsible for the cultural transitioning and student development needs of Northwestern's international students, as well as for helping support American students of color. She works closely with the college's international admissions and financial aid counselor to ensure international students' immigration needs are met. She also leads Northwestern's international programs, manages relationships with partner institutions overseas, coordinates ESL services for students who need them, and serves on the Diversity Resource Committee. Joseph is now working alongside Norimichi Odate, an English teacher and Director of

## VAN DER WEIDE SHARES EXPERIENCES SERVING **IN THE UNITED STATES ARMY**

MAURICE — Dustin Van Der Veide of Maurice was always Interested in enlisting in the Army. OF County Weide of Maurice was always interested in enlisting in the Army. In high school, he talked it over with his parents, Jeff and Cindy, who were

They told him it was his decision. So in 2017, he drove to Sioux City and enlisted in the Army, applying for the position of Forward Observer. "Forward Observers are the guys who go out with Infantry or tanks and tell either artillery or mortars where to target," he explained. We use a grid location, either with maps and compass or laser range finders, and we're pretty careful to do it right: we don't want the mortars falling on us!"

On July 3, Van Der Weide shipped out for Basic Training to Fort Benning, Ga., then to Fort Sill, Okla., to train as a Forward Observer. He also trained as a Joint Fires Observer who can call in close air support, like airplanes and helicopters.

Van Der Weide was sent to Fort Riley, Kan., for his duty station, attached to the First Infantry Division. When he arrived, his unit was overseas, so he was deployed to Grafenwoehr, Germany, a few weeks after he came. "Germany was pretty nice," he smiled. We left in early March, which is still cold in Kansas, but the weather was nice in Germany. I didn't get to see much, though, because two days after I got there, we were sent out for a month-long training exercise!"

The unit was sent to Camp Hohenfels, which is the Joint Multinational Readiness Center (JMRC) in Europe. JMRC is the only Army Combat Training Center outside the continental U.S., and its goal supportive. is to train participants in all warfighting functions. When Van Der Weide was there, he trained with Germans, Ukrainians, and Georgians. "We had a mock battle," he explained. "We do quite a few of these for training. I met my friend Frank Whatley from Colorado over there. A lot of times, we would go out to the Observation Post and

stay there for a week or so. We had to call in rounds and observe if they were landing where they were supposed to be. In our downtime, we would pull two Bradley Infantry fighting vehicles next to each other, hang a tent over them, and play Spades in the shade until we were called. One time we had a new Private driving the Personnel Carrier. The Sergeant and I were in the
