## County goes after CDBG grant for LCHD building

Lee County Supervisors are pursuing a \$800,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to help fund the construction of a new home for the Lee County Health Department and ambulance bay at 5001 Ave. O in Fort Madison.

The preliminary cost of the new building is \$5.5 million.

Tracey Lamm, regional development coordinator with Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission out of Burlington, said there is no deadline for submitting the application, but that doing so soon would be to the county's advantage.

"At the moment we're

kind of fishing because Lee County is eligible for \$800,000 right now, but that could change after the first the year and drop to \$500,000," she said.

Further, Lamm said the CDBG comes from federal Housing and Urban Development funds and 51% of the grant must benefit low to moderate income residents in the community in which the project is located.

"That's what qualifies you to apply for these funds," she said, adding that because the LCHD serves some clients fitting this criteria, she will be surveying the LCHD records for this data to include with the grant application.

Lamm said the 51% requirement can be met in other ways as well, including those served by the ambulance bay that is to be located at the site.

Lamm said supervisors are also required to address community needs, which again, can be shown through the LCHD and Lee County EMS services. She said because the county participates in the Great River Trust Fund, that will show assistance is being provided to housing needs of low to moderate residents.

The CDBG, if awarded, will be coupled with other sources of funding, including a pending federal USDA grant and the remaining \$3.6 million in county's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) fund.

A fund for donations to the project has also been set up by the North Lee County and Keokuk Community Foundations.

The county now owns the property at 5001 Ave. O, valued at \$117,000, which was donated by the Glen Meller family through Meller's Circle M, Inc.

Although the USDA and CDBG applications are pending, supervisors have indicated that a portion of the project may need to be funded through a bond.

Carl A. Nelson Co. out of Burlington is the construction manager for the project and is doing the master plan for the property that is just under 10 acres.
