There's no doubt that this year's Cascade football team was an entertaining and athletic team to watch, as the Cougars played their way into the Class 1A State Playoffs and finished at 5-4 overall.

Cascade opened the year with a solid 21-13 win over highly regarded Monticello before Durant won a 26-13 contest week two

The Cougars bounced back with a win over Anamosa week three, and won a memorable 14-13 decision over Beckman Catholic at home the next Friday.

"Before the season if you would have told me we would beat Monticello and Beckman (both ranked at the time) and finish 5-4 on the season, I would have thought you were nuts," said coach Tim Frake

A strong Waterloo Columbus Catholic team handled Cascade, 42-14, week five, but the resilient Cougars rebounded with a big win at Sumner-Fredericksburg the following week, setting up a showdown with eventual district champ MFL-MarMac that went the Bulldogs' way, 33-20.

Needing a win over winless Postville in week eight, it was all Cascade in a 49-14 affair. The Cougars drew a tough playoff matchup at Dike-New Hartford in round one of the playoffs, where the Wolverines' speed and depth was too much for the visitors in a 48-14 win.

"Going into every season there is always high hope for what the team can accomplish. We knew our strengths were going to be our great returning class and our athleticism and talent," said Frake. "We also knew we had some weaknesses that we had to overcome."

Cascade stretched the field offensively and, with a group of athletic skill players, presented opposing defenses with plenty of challenges. The Cougars averaged 23.3

points a game while gaining 1250 yards through the air and 1547 on the ground.

"During the offseason the coaches spent time refreshing the offense and designing a new defense to best fit our players," Frake said.

Quarterback Will Hosch threw for 1208 yards and 12 touchdowns, to an able receiving corps that included Mason Otting, Cass Hoffman, Ty Frasher and Luke Ruggeberg.

Will Menster led a potent running game with 975 yards and 11 touchdowns before being sidelined with a season-ending collarbone injury.

Frake praised a senior class that led the way.

"The team only goes as far as the seniors will take you. This group has had a huge impact on our program with many of the players contributing at the varsity level for three or four years. I know they have been dedicated to the game of football for a long time, and their time and effort were greatly appreciated," he said Alverado and Conrad one.
