## Reveille to be shown in Cedar Rapids

The full-feature film - 'Reveille' which includes two actors from Wellsburg - Bernd Wittneben and Jorg Rochlitzer, will be screened at the 2023 Cedar Rapids Independent Film Festival, April 14-16 at Collins Road Theatres, Marion. This will be the first time the film has been shown in Iowa and precludes the nomination and hope of a second showing at the 32nd annual Iowa Motion Picture Association in

Forest City on May 6.
Wittneben, who was born and raised in Braunschweig, Germany, plays the role of Walter Brander, a German squad leader, along the Winter Line in Italy in late 1943. Three of his unit are killed by an American squad. Four others, three who are

mortally wounded, are taken prisoner.

The film focuses on the moral dilemma of whether or not to end the Germans' suffering or honor the rules of war and protect wounded prisoners.

Rochlitzer explains that the film has been shown in the festival circuits in both the United States and Europe, receiving nearly fifty awards and recognitions.

As the festivals have proceeded, the pair explain that their lives have been a whirlwind, though now they are beginning to relax and enjoy their labor.

"Festivals in Italy – Florence and Milan were very good to us," Rochlitzer said. "Within a couple weeks we hope to have

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## AGWSR eighth graders hold Penny War



ouse of Hope, Waterloo, is the chosen benefactor of the AGWSR eighth grader's first-ever Penny War. Students presented a check for \$1,272.60 to Dusky Steele, House of Hope development director, last Tuesday morning.

The presentation followed a two-week challenge between eighthgrade Cougar Time groups in which students collected pennies for the organization which provides single-mother families and women who age out of foster care with individualized support and transitional housing while securing families with independence and permanent homes to end the cycle of homelessness in the Cedar Valley.

Students researched various organizations together determining that House of Hope would be the benefactor of their event

Time sections, based on our homerooms," said Carli Lyon, middle school student council member. "We'd visited Waterloo during a field trip and chose House of Hope as a way to give back to the community for the fun we had there during our

trip."
Claire Meyer, also a member of the student council, explained the rules of the Penny War.

"Each homeroom had a bucket in their class-room to drop pennies into," she began. "Each penny was worth one point and the group with the most points won." Meyer added that each class could sabotage others and deduct points from them by dropping silver coins or bills into their buckets. The losing team's homeroom teacher – the class with the

least points, got a pie in the face, with the classroom teacher with the most points being able to throw the pie.

"It was very competitive!" said Crystal Palmateer, another student council member. "Everyone was sneaking in silver coins and burying bills in other buckets."
