lowa's pheasant opener busy with hunter success

Hunters are home, the dogs are resting and Iowa's opening weekend of pheasant season is in the rearview mirror. Reports from across the state varied from excellent up north to good in central and southwest Iowa, with the consensus that hunting will continue to improve once all the corn is harvested.

According to reports, hunters turned out in good numbers, filling parking lots and field access lanes.

"It's the best bird numbers we've had since I've been in east-central Iowa. I'm still seeing hunters out today," said Curt Kemmerer, wildlife biologist for the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Maquoketa Unit.

"Lots of hunters and good number of birds in central Iowa – a great opener," said Captain Matt Bruner, supervisor for the Iowa DNR's Law Enforcement Bureau for north-central Iowa.

"I counted 14 cars at one 475-acre area in north Iowa. The guys I talked to had seen birds, but also made comments about many more people than the past," said TJ Herrick, wildlife biologist for the Iowa DNR's Clear Lake Unit.

"Lots of hunters out on Saturday," said Matt Dollison, wildlife biologist for the Iowa DNR's Nishnabotna Unit. "Bird numbers were similar to last year. Warm weather and standing corn made hunting a little difficult."

Nonresident hunters were plentiful as well, with hunters from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Nebraska and Ohio making up to one third of the cars in north Iowa parking lots.

Those field reports mirrored what the annual August roadside survey found.

"Our bird numbers are similar to last year so that should make some folks pretty happy," said Todd Bogenschutz, upland wildlife research biologist with the Iowa DNR. "I think we're set up for a good hunting year for pheasants, especially in northwest, west central and north central regions. Central too. Quail is also looking good in southwest and south-central Iowa."

Iowa's pheasant season runs through Jan. 10, 2023.

"We have struggled with our hitting, and I think our focus needs to shift from trying to hit home runs to just get base hits. We don't have home run hitters on this team," Banken said.


The new IF-A coach also wants to implement a more aggressive style on the bases and her expectation is that everyone in the lineup will become comfortable bunting.

Fifth set run spurs Cougars into semis

railing by seven points in a deciding fifth set to a heavily favored team didn't seem to rattle AGWSR.

During Tuesday's Class 1A State Quarterfinals, the Cougars were two points away from being eliminated from the tournament.

After falling behind 13-6, senior Tessa Sperfslage served up nine points in a row as AGWSR upin stunning fashion - 25-21, 11-25, 25-27, 25-14, 15-13 - to advance to Wednesday's semifinal.

"No one wants to end their season poorly. Everyone wants to go out playing as hard as they can," said sophomore setter Trevyn Smith. "Something that we've talked about all season is flipping the switch. We kind of flipped the switch and decided that we wanted to just go out playing the best volleyball that we can."

Heading into the tournament, North Tama (39-5) had not lost a match in a month and carried an 18-match win streak dating back to Oct. 1. However, AGWSR (19-23) was on a run of their own and had won five in a row and had not surrendered a set during postseason action.

After an early 3-3 tie in the fifth game, North Tama scored three in a row, forcing a Cougar timeout. The Redhawks tallied three more to lead 6-3, forcing another AG-WSR stop. The lead would be 10-3 before a Brynn Smith hit stopped the bleeding.

Just two points away from elimination, Lila Vaughn produced a kill to give the Cougars the ball back and put the ball in Sperfslage's hands.

"I honestly don't know (what changed). I think part of it was that I had a group of seniors that didn't want to see their season be done. We've got kids that are really competitive that battle for every point and I think it was also, just deep down somewhere, they knew they could do it and it was getting that momentum shifted to our side a little bit so we could kind of roll with it," said AGWSR head coach Jill Smith. "Tessa first off, way to make your serves. She was a rockstar. She hit those zones right where we needed her to. They were having trouble getting into their offense and part of it with them, and I think (Jadyn) Rausch was in the back row during that run which helped us because she couldn't be an attacker."

Down 13-7, Sperfslage went back to serve for the Cougars and jumpstarted the 9-0 run – which included an ace to win the match.
