Tith some of the competition Ellsworth Community College has faced early this season, it was unknown how good they really were.

The No. 7 Panthers (6-0) shot down plenty of naysayers on Saturday afternoon in the final game of the Dale Howard Classic. Facing the top-10 rated Rochester Community and Technical College, ECC won in dominating fashion 93-68. In the game the night before, the Panthers were never contested in a 105-29 dismantling

of Western Technical College

In the tournament finale, ECC trailed the Yellowjackets 13-12 at the 12:21 mark. Arlandus Keyes was fouled while shooting a three and made all his freebies to take the 15-13 advantage.

The Panthers then went on a 14-4 run to go up 31-17 and forced a Rochester timeout. The lead continued to swell in the opening half as ECC went on another run and were on top of the No. 9 team in Division III by 22 at the break (50-28).

The Yellowjackets (2-1)

scored with the Panthers in the second 20 minutes but could not stop the high powered offense from scoring buckets. Three ECC players were in double figures and 12 reached the scoring column. Leading the way was Shawn Fulcher with 16 points. Keyes finished with 15 and Saliou Seye had 12.

To open the home tournament on Friday, the Panthers completely blew Western Technical College out of the water from the beginning. ECC jumped out to a 34-0 start before the Cavaliers even got on the board. The Panther

defense held Western scoreless the first 13 minutes of the game. The hosts built a 54-10 lead at the break that continued to swell in the second half.

The Cavaliers shot just 15 percent from the floor against ECC and were two of 25 from downtown. The Panthers on the other hand shot 51 percent from the floor and made 13 three-pointers. Five were in double digits. Diondre Taylor led with 17 points, Dior Davis and Tarik Islamovic both added 10 and Bruce Kanno and Clayton Ubben each chipped in 10.
