DYSART — The Great Dysart Gorge is in need of a makeover — and the funds to do so.

Beginning this week, Anthony Gasco with Accent Painting and Refinishing of La Porte City will be working to repaint the giant anamorphic illusion on Dysart's downtown Main Street.

The Great Dysart Gorge was first painted onto the street back in May of 2018 by hundreds of volunteers in an effort to court more tourists to the picturesque downtown and its small businesses.

In 1923, Traer celebrated the 50th anniversary of its founding. One focal point of the town celebration was the dedication of the "Legion Arch" which was built at Taylor Park as a memorial to the seven men from Traer that died during the Great War (1914-1918).

The seven men include Edward Kubik, Clair Finch, George Wieben, Fred Pippert, William McTurk, Roy Pearce and Edgar McCord and they are listed on an honor roll located by the Arch.

In 2023, Traer is now celebrating its sesquicentennial. A cemetery walk entitled "On Behalf of a Grateful Nation" is set for Monday, Memorial Day, May 29. The program will begin with an open house of the updated military display at the Traer Historical Museum. Doors open at 7:30 a.m.
