
For her part, Grady said it was "surreal."

Sheldon received a lesson in the fickle nature of the game of golf and of the weather in this part of Iowa during the Siouxland Conference Boys Golf Tour stops last week

The Orabs will try to be prepared for anything as it heads to an 18-hole conference meet at The Ridge in Sioux Center on Thursday. The Siouxland teams are at an event hosted by Okoboji at Emerald Hills Golf Course in Arnolds Park on Monday.

The stop hosted by Central Lyon in Rock Rapids on Tuesday, April 25, saw cool but playable conditions on what is generally the easiest course on the tour. As a result, the scores for every team came down substantially. That included Sheldon, which shot a season-low 197.

"It's good to see continued progress," said Sheldon coach Jerod Reinking. "As guys start to get a little more comfortable, they are making better decisions based on how the round is going for them rather than forcing an issue that isn't working that particular day.'

Unfortunately for the Orabs, their improvement only mirrored the rest of the league, and they still finished 10th in the team standings.

Gavin Strouth and Chase Oldenkamp led Sheldon. Each of them carded a 48.

"It was good to see Gavin get down into the 40s. With it being his first year, he's really got a lot going on trying go figure out how to play in meets, manage a golf course and on top of that work on his golf swing," Reinking said. "I'm glad to see glimpses of it coming together."

The coach said at this point the mental aspects of the game are what will save the team strokes.

"We know we're all capable of continuing to knock shots off just by making smarter choices and limiting mistakes," he said. "We keep trying to inch closer to the pack. This was a positive step in that direction."

The teams ran into cold, wet and windy conditions on Thursday on a difficult Rock Valley course and the Orabs' score ballooned to a 221.

"We didn't have a ton of shooting opportunities, but toward the end it was getting close," Keepers said.


