As Brynn Malo crossed the finish line with her arms raised, tears of happiness poured out of her eyes.

Malo, Humboldt's freshman sensation, had just qualified for the Class 3A state cross country meet by finishing runner-up in a qualifying meet in Humboldt on Oct. 19 at lower Sheldon

Malo, who entered the meet to state.

"I'm really excited! I'm really happy right now. This means so much right now," Malo said.

"I was ranked seventh going in based on my time and I started off faster than I usually run. About the time I got to the little dip on the course I ended up second and I knew I had to keep going until the end," Malo said.

"Getting off to a strong start was the key today. You have to do that and keep going, otherwise you get cut off and it's hard to move up," Malo said.

"The pace is fast in a meet like this and once I got ahead, I knew I just had to keep going. I try not to let it get into my head because it's just a normal race at the end of the day," Malo

"This is my home course and I like it here. I knew where I needed to slow down and where to speed up during the race," Malo said.

Malo will be Humboldt's lone entry in the state meet at Lakeside Golf Course on Saturday, Oct. 29.

Wildcats smack Algona, 31-8, charge into state playoffs!

8-1 Wildcats host Hampton-Dumont-CAL Friday night in 1st round playoff game

Jordan Coon rushes for 206 yards, 4 TDs

In the typical workmanlike, dominating fashion which they've played this fall, the Humboldt football team charged into the Class 3A state playoffs by whipping the Algona Bulldogs, 31-8 at Algona last week (Oct. 21).

Wildcat junior running back Lance Coon rushed for 206 yards on 22 carries and scored four touchdowns to power the Wildcats, who finished the regular season 8-1 overall and finished in a 3-way tie for the 3A District 2 title with Nevada and North Polk.

Humboldt's defense, one of the best in the state all season long, pretty much kept the Bulldog offense contained, led by senior end Tayeton Lohaus, who had three quarterback sacks in the first half alone.

The triumph in the final game of the regular season sets up Humboldt's first round state playoff this Friday night (Oct. 28) at Mason Maach Field when the Wildcats host Hampton-Dumont-CAL.

"I was real proud of the kids. Our defense stepped up bigtime and played a great game. They allowed one big play which allowed Algona to score their only touchdown, but still played really, really well," Elman said.

"We put a lot of pressure on Alex Manske. He's such a good quarterback and we had to make sure we put pressure on him and contain him," Elman said. "There were a few times he broke containment but we were able to chase him down. It shows that our kids never gave up and that's so import-

"It was nice to see Lance Coon do a really good job of feeling his blockers and then accelerate once he found that hole. Lance was able to spark us with his four touchdowns in the first half," Elman said.

"Our offensive line had a really nice game at Algona. They did a great job of making and sustaining blocks. It was great to see the level that they played at in the game," Elman said.

Humboldt needed just two plays to score on its opening drive of the game. After stuffing the Bulldogs' opening series to force a punt, Corey Dettmann's kick return gave Humboldt a first down at the

Humboldt's season ends in region 3 semifinal

Ninth ranked Bondurant-Farrar avenged an early season loss to the Humboldt volleyball team and did it when they need-

In a Class 4A Region 3 semifinal round match in the Blue Jay gym on Oct. 20, Humboldt's season came to an end by scores of 25-15, 25-14 and 25-20.

The Wildcats finish the year at 19-13 overall while Bondurant-Farrar took a 23-10 record into their regional final match with No. 7 ranked North Polk on Oct. 25 at Alleman.

Humboldt won in five sets over the Blue Jays back on Aug. 25, but the Blue Jays enjoyed the return of their senior setter, who wasn't in the lineup in the first

"Bondurant is a very good team. A team we have to respect. It's been a good rivalry the last few years. It's been fun to add them to our schedule. Last year they came into Humboldt and we got up 2-0 on them and they came back and won. This year we went down there and they got up 2-0 on us and we came back and won the next three sets,"

"Going into this one I knew they would be hungry for the win. They have two really strong hitters. A middle hitter who is 6-2 and a really strong outside hitter. With their setter back, they passed really well to those two big hitters and we weren't able to shut them down," Waldorf said.

"Our goal going in was to win, obviously. The first set we did not pass well. They served really hard at us and had us out of our system the entire game. That

was a huge factor in that loss. We made some changes for the back row in the second game and our passing started to come on a little bit. It was better in game two, but our hitting just wasn't there," Waldorf said.

"We made a lot of hitting errors in that match and Bondurant's middle hitter caused us problems. We struggled defending her. We couldn't get a block up on her. It made it hard playing defense around that," Waldorf said.

In set three the two teams were tied 6-6 early on. A kill by Addie Thompson put Humboldt up 11-9. The Wildcats continued to push the tempo and led 17-14 before the Blue Jays scored four straight points to regain the lead at 18-17.

A kill by Kayla Gieber pulled Humboldt within three at 23-20, but the Blue Jays scored the next two points to win the set and the

"Going into the third set I decided to go to a 6-2 offense to add some extra blocking in the front row. We put in Ashlynn Works in the front row to add some blocking and try to add some more offense.
