Newton adopts ATV/UTV ordinance with limits on state highways

Council will review the code in one year to make any possible revisions

Iowa law now allows for expanded operation of ATVs and UTVs on roadways, and although an ordinance passed by council members on Nov. 7 upholds that law the city prohibits extended use of the off-road vehicles on state highways, like parts of Highway 14 and First Avenue/U.S. Route 6 in Newton.

Specifically, ATVs and UTVs are prohibited from operating on the 100-2300 block of Highway 14 South and the 100-300 block of Highway 14 North. ATVs and UTVs can be operated on First Avenue over the most direct and accessible route, but driving on the road for prolonged distances is not allowed.

Drivers can use an all-terrain vehicle park or trail outside of the city limits, a secondary road outside of city limits, a city street on which such vehicles are

County creates job positions for EMS enhancement program

6 providers will be available to offset struggles felt by volunteer agencies and rural patients

The creation of six permanent parttime positions for the sheriff's office is the first step in enhancing emergency medical services in Jasper County.

Supervisors approved a resolution on Nov. 8 to add the advanced life support(ALS)/basic life support (BLS) technicians to the Jasper County SherHalferty collaborated with human resources to create the six positions, which consist of four new providers and the two currently on staff.

1:20 p.m. — Tyler Stewart knows he's the underdog and his chances are slim

Six hours after Stewart cast his ballot at the county administration office precinct, his students found out he was running for office. Admittedly, that was my doing.
