"He goes, 'Cindy come here and sit with us, so I went, sat and talked with them and he went, 'You need to apply for that deputy clerk's job.' I told him I didn't have the training and he said just apply for it. I applied and I got it, I didn't think I would ever get it," she explained. "I started as deputy clerk and when the clerk passed away I became the clerk, so I was deputy clerk

for about seven years."

When Lantow first started working for the city in June 1989 she went to clerk school, which was one week of training every summer for three years. Brad Niewoehner was clerk at the time so he helped her learn a lot as they would work on various tasks together but when he passed away unexpectedly Lantow had to learn a lot on her own.

# allows flags to be disposed of properly

Outside of the AMVETS Hall, Fredericksburg, along Main Street is a new drop box which has been installed to allow members of the community to properly dispose of worn flags. AM-VETS commander Ralph Schultz and Rollie Cahoy installed the drop box Thursday, Dec. 1.

"There have been times over the past years where I have seen flag drop boxes in use and decided Fredericksburg needed a drop box," Schultz commented. "Previously people would bring them to my house and this is easier for everyone. Seeing the drop boxes will remind people to drop off worn flags instead of the flags getting thrown away improperly."

The drop box in Fredericksburg will be checked weekly and flags will be disposed of in a yearly flag burning ceremony conducted by the AMVETS members.
