

Blue super moon set to shine

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Tonight look up to the sky and you will see an uncommon celestial event. The moon will be full for the second time this month and that is called a 'blue moon.'

Its not a common occurrence, hence the saying "once in a blue moon."

In fact, according to information from NASA, a blue moon happens every two or three years. The last one was also in August, in 2021 and if you should happen to miss this one, the next blue moon will be in May of

2026.There's another note that makes this full moon special. According to Space.com, It is

also a so-called "supermoon" and the second supermoon of the month. A supermoon comes when the full moon is within 90 percent of its closest approach to Earth, or perigee.

The moon's orbit is not exactly circular, but elliptical, as most bodies orbiting another. It's perigee is 221,942 miles away and the moon will be at that point at noon today, Aug. 30, meaning the night's moonrise will be very close to that perigee.

Space.com continues by saying that the term supermoon is not an astrological one, but actually was coined by an astrologer. Astronomers' have a more scientific term for the event, "perigean full moon," but it just does not roll off the tongue like supermoon, so that, relative

Insight remains committed to Keokuk hospital reopening despite challenges

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Insight, the company that acquired the Keokuk Hospital from Blessing earlier this year, remains committed to reopening the facility as a rural emergency hospital (REH) despite the challenges involved. Keokuk City Administrator Cole O'Donnell confirmed that he and Mayor Kathie Mahoney had an in-person meeting with Insight representatives, including their medical director, to discuss the progress of the hospital's reopening.

According to O'Donnell's

report to the Council on Aug. 17, during the meeting, a former hospital employee who helped maintain the building accompanied the team from Insight on a tour of the hospital, allowing them to inspect "every nook and cranny" and "learn all the different secrets about it."

O'Donnell stated that Insight is still committed to opening the hospital as an REH. "At this point, they hope to have it operational by December or January," he said.

However, the timeline is dependent upon funding. "It's dependent upon some grants

they're looking into and at other capital possibilities, O'Donnell said.

Once the emergency room is up and running, Insight hopes to expand its outpatient services and is looking at a variety of methods to accomplish its vision.

Insight also has a longterm goal of bringing back the hospital as an inpatient facility, but this will require additional legislation at the federal level for them to get some designations. O'Donnell cautioned that this

ly new term, has made its way into our language.

The supermoon is not overly rare, according to Space. com. Out of the 12 or 13 full moons per year, usually four of them are supermoons. There may be a few as two in a year or as many as five.

But since this is also a blue moon, that makes it uncommon. The term blue moon also has nothing to do with the color of the satellite. Unless there's some atmospheric forces to change the hue of the moon, then it will be its normal yellow to white color as it rises. That moonrise is set to take place at 7:50 p.m. tonight.

Try to get out and see the moon rise, because that is when we will see the moon illusion, according to Space. com. The moon, when it is close to the horizon looks enormous. The fact that the moon is closer to Earth than other times in its orbit will amplify this effect.

How often does it seem that clouds interfere with something we want to see in the sky? So far, the forecast for this event seems to be clear skies and even cool temps to get out and enjoy the sight.

Just for good measure, there's a third element to sky watching tonight. The full moon will see the planet Saturn about five and a half degrees to its upper right.

Daughters said they have updated the roof, patched and painted the parking lot, and more. As well as provided an updated menu for the drive-thru window.

is only a possibility and is dependent upon the legislation. "It's only a possibility that they're thinking about it should everything fall in line," O'Donnell said. "I don't want anybody to think, or get the false impression that Insight is here to open an inpatient facility. That is something that they hope to do but may not come about depending upon the legislation.'

Federal regulations have outlined REH requirements. Currently, all candidate hospitals must have 50 beds or less and be located in a federally defined rural area. According to an article published by The Hawk Eye, in October 2022, Keokuk saw 1.5 inpatients and 22-24 ER patients per day before the hospital closed.

Blessing Hospital is the closest level II trauma center to Keokuk, located in Quincy. The closest level I is the University of Iowa Hospitals in Iowa City. Even with the addition of an REH in Keokuk, the hospital's primary objectives would be to "treat and street" (quick discharge) or "stabilize and transfer" (airlift or ambulance transfer) more patients needing more

intensive or long-term care. Insight is still awaiting news about funding from Governor Kim Reynolds' office (the city recently

asked residents to submit letters asking the state for funding on behalf of Insight).

According to O'Donnell, there is no information about which level I or II hospital Insight will work with for a transfer agreement or how much maintenance on the building is required before Insight opens the hospital.

During the Aug. 17 City Council meeting, Mayor Kathie Mahoney announced that Insight had entered a float into the Labor Day Parade, which was later confirmed by O'Donnell, who added Insight also planned to participate in the city's annual Main Street Merchant Trick or Treat night.

Chicago TV news crew robbed at gunpoint while reporting on a string of robberies

CHICAGO (AP) — A Chicago television news crew reporting on a string of robberies ended up robbed themselves after they were accosted at gunpoint by three armed men wearing ski masks.

Spanish-language station Univision Chicago said a reporter and photographer were filming just before 5 a.m. Monday in Chicago's West Town neighborhood when three masked men brandishing firearms robbed them, taking their television camera and other items.

"They were approached with guns and robbed. Mainly it was personal items, and they took a camera," Luis Godinez, vice president of news at Univision Chicago, told the Chicago Tribune.

Godinez said the news crew was filming a story about robberies in the West Town community that was slated to run on the morning news. He said the footage they shot was in the stolen camera, and the story never made it on the air.

Chicago police identified the victims as a 28-year-old man and 42-year-old man. Police said the pair was outside when the three men drove up in a gray sedan and black SUV. After the armed robbers took items from the news crew they fled in their vehicles. No injuries were reported and no one is in custody, police said.

Godinez said Univision Chicago, the local TV affiliate of international media company TelevisaUnivision, is not disclosing the names of the reporter and photographer to protect their privacy.

"They're OK, and we're working on it together as a team," he said.

The episode was the second robbery this month involving a Chicago news crew, after a WLS-TV photographer was assaulted and robbed on Aug. 8 while preparing to cover a weekday afternoon news conference on Chicago's West Side, the station reported.
